A Message from Fr. Torvend

aturday, August 6, marks the feast of the Transfiguration of our Lord Jesus Christ. Should you want to meditate on the scriptural readings appointed for this day, you will find them here: http://satucket.com/lectionary/Tranfiguration.htm. On one level, the feast points us to the possibility of ongoing conversion into the life of Christ and his kingdom of love and forgiveness, justice and peace; that is, an openness within us to the movement of the Spirit, the transfiguring

Spirit in our lives so that what we say and do in worship shapes our daily lives in the world. Does this ring a bell: "Send us now into the world in peace, and grant us strength and courage to love and serve you with gladness and singleness of heart." No easy thing to do, to be people committed to peace and single-minded in our love for others, especially those who annoy us or oppose us.

On the same date, August 6, the United States dropped an atomic bomb on the Japanese city of Hiroshima, killing almost 70,000 instantly: the first time a weapon of massive destruction was used in human warfare. Tens of thousands of civilians died in subsequent years from burns and radiation poisoning.

On this day we behold the radiant light Christ," 2009 that surrounds Jesus as he is called God's beloved on a hilltop and the blinding light

that fell upon a city of civilians bringing death and destruction. "Send us now into the world in peace," we pray right after receiving holy communion, welcoming the presence of the wounded and risen Christ into our lives. Peace or war? Where will our energies go?


Townhall Meeting: August 7 at Noon

or decades, organist **Dana Robinson** has created programs of the finest repertoire carefully chosen to capture the essence of each unique instrument he performs on.

Described in The Diapason as "an "organists' organist" with "faultless accuracy, rhythmic drive, and astounding musical

sensitivity," Dana has also been lauded in The Tracker for offering "the pièce de resistance of the evening . . . put[ting] heart and soul into the four movements of Widor's monumental Symphonie Gothique."

His credits include performances for the national conventions of the Organ Historical Society and the Westfield Center for Early Keyboard Studies, as well as for regional conventions of the American Guild of Organists. In duo concerts with Paul Tegels, Professor of Organ at Pacific Lutheran University, Dana explores repertoire by J. C. Bach, Mozart, Schumann, Mendelssohn, and Saint-Saëns, among others. His recording of J. S. Bach's Orgelbüchlein is available on the Arsis label, and his recent video recordings on a rare antique pedal piano of works by Robert Schumann can be viewed on the YouTube channel, "Dana Robinson Organist."

As Associate Professor of Organ and Chairman of the Keyboard Area at the School of Music at the University of Illinois, Dana has taught students who have gone on to earn top honors at The National Young Artists Competition in Organ Performance of the American Guild of

Organists, the Shanghai Conservatory

International Organ Competition, the Albert Schweitzer

Competition, the Arthur Poister competition, and the Franz Schmidt International

Competition (Austria.) Dana previously taught Central College at (lowa) and Luther College. He has served Organist as and Choirmaster at Trinity Cathedral in Davenport, Iowa, and is currently Organist at Grace Lutheran Church in Champaign, Illinois.

Christ Church History

Lemuel Wells (1841-1936) for whom the Christ Church Parish Hall is named, was born in Yonkers, New York. He graduated from Berkeley Divinity School (at Yale University) and was ordained in 1869. In 1871 he went west to serve in the mission in Walla Walla. He was called to Tacoma in 1885 and served as rector at St. Luke's Episcopal Church, a forerunner to Christ Church. During the Civil War Lemuel Wells was commissioned as Second Lieutenant with Company F, Wisconsin and served in the mounted infantry. The following is an excerpt from his autobiography.

CHAPTER IV. CIVIL WAR DAYS

nother important part of my preparation for a missionary was my army experience in the Civil War...

...We were soon ordered to Memphis, Tennessee, to patrol that city as a provost guard because it was found that the city government was in league with the rebels....


My company was quartered in the Overton Hospital which had been closed on account of the war. We were assigned to the care of one of the wards of the city and I made a round every few hours. The

town was full of rebels and one always had to keep a cocked pistol in his hand to be ready for any emergency. As you turned a corner you would sometimes meet a fusillade from a group of rebels or you would be passing a house and someone would throw up a window and begin to fire at you. My escape from death was certainly miraculous....

General Sherman had made several attempts in vain to take Vicksburg and was succeeded by Grant who invested the city May 18, 1863. On May 19, he made an assault and failed and I reported to him for duty the next day. The commander of his body guard had been killed and he had asked General Veech to send a proper person for the post. As I was in command of the provost guard of our division he sent me although I was only a lieutenant. When I reported to the chief of staff for duty he

told me that a desperate attempt was being made to murder the General and that I must always have him surrounded with a guard and admit no stranger to his quarters and when he went outside of his quarters I must always follow behind him with a pistol cocked and ready to fire.

Soon after my arrival a general assault was made upon the city and the enemy exploded an enormous mine under our advancing troops and blew hundreds of them into the air. The sun for a few minutes was obscured by legs and arms and heads and bodies mingled with

dust and stones. So we were repulsed. It was a terrible slaughter.

General Grant turned to me hastily and said, "Take a guard and immediately arrest all newspaper reporters and bring them to me. Captain Eckles will show them to you as he knows them. Also stop all outgoing mail."

When I brought them to the General he said, "Gentlemen, this disaster must not get out until I give permission. Just now it would be disastrous and if any of you sends a report of it to his paper I will have him shot instantly." The news did not get out until Vicksburg was taken, and I have never seen it in print. Immediately following the disaster he ordered me to summon the division commanders to a council of war. When they were gathered in his quarters he asked each in turn what he advised. They all advised to raise the seige. When all had spoken he said, "Generals, you have all given sound military advice but by the eternal (and seizing a bottle standing at his elbow, he raised it aloft and brought it down on the table with a crash) we will take the city" and the glass and whiskey spattered us all. But at the next attempt we took the city. ~ Lemuel Wells, A Pioneer Missionary, (Seattle: Progressive Printing, No Date).

Christ Church Columbarium

hat IS a columbarium? A Columbarium is a room or structure designed as a final resting place to house cremated remains. It is a permanent structure with banks of cremation niches (similar to cubbyholes, but with secure fronts) that hold cremation urns. A columbarium can be large or small, private or public.


When Trinity House, the building between the sanctuary and Wells Hall, was built in 1958, it included a Columbarium beneath the Chapel. The entrance is to the right of the door, through a beautiful gate.

The Columbarium was designed by the architect Marshall W. Perrow. It has five banks of niches. Each niche was designed to hold three copper urns. The initial set of niches were reserved for parish members who contributed to the capital campaign for Trinity house. Since 1958, many parish members have purchased niches for burial and future burials. We have many niches reserved for future internment of parish members. Currently there are three niches that remain open. It is a quiet and peaceful place in which our loved ones are honored, where one can sit quietly and pray. One of the curiosities of our Columbarium is that the cop-


per urns designed to fit in the niches are too small to hold all the ashes of a person. Families are welcome to take the remaining ashes, to scatter or keep as they wish. For those who do not take the remaining ashes, we periodically have an internment service, where the clergy scatters the ashes in the garden around the reflection pool.


