All Souls All the Faithful Departed, November 2

The Episcopal calendar includes a feast for All the Faithful Departed, commonly called All Souls (November 2). This day is devoted to remembering our beloved dead and praying for them "because we still hold them in our love, and because we trust that in God's presence those who have chosen to serve

God will grow in God's love" (BCP 862). On Wednesday, November 2, at 7 PM we will celebrate the feast of All Souls at Holy Eucharist and, for the first time, use the beautiful readings, prayers, and songs appointed for this day. This solemn liturgy will include

All Saints, November 6

On the Episcopal calendar, the feast of All Saints (November 1) is a baptismal feast day in which we renew our baptismal vows within the communion of all the saints: the women and men of heroic virtue who serve as guides for living as Christians in the world today. Their names are found on pages 19-30 of the Book of Common Prayer or you can find them here, with a short biography (http://www.satucket.com/lectionary/Calendar.htm).



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This year, the Episcopal calendar transfers the feast of **All Saints** to **Sunday, November 6.** On this day, we will celebrate one Holy Eucharist at 10:30 AM, with the renewal of baptismal promises and the welcome of newcomers to Christ Church, followed by a reception in Wells Hall.



Whatever you bring must be easily opened without dependence on a can opener or a stove for cooking. Why do we give with all our hearts? It's who we are. Helping our sisters and brothers

As members and friends of Christ Church, we are part of a transnational network of Episcopal communities. The Episcopal Church includes dioceses outside the boundaries of the United States: the Dioceses of Taiwan, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Colombia, the Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Honduras, Venezuela, Europe, and Haiti.

Of the 112 dioceses that constitute the Episcopal Church, the Diocese of Haiti boasts the largest number of members. And it is this impoverished country, a country that has suffered earthquakes and hurricanes, which is now tormented by gang warfare and social chaos. In light of such chaos, the Haitian prime minister, Ariel Henry, has asked the United Nations to send a large contingent of troops to restore order and peace. Clean water sources are low and cholera has broken out among the population. Many are without adequate food and basic medical supplies. Children, the future of this island nation, are hungry.
