A Distinctive Spirituality

During our adult formation discussion of Anglican spirituality, we noted how important it is in the Pacific Northwest to participate in a spiritual community that has a distinctive spirituality. That's a different question than what we might "like" about the parish.

As members and friends of this Anglican or Episcopal parish, we inhabit a spiritual legacy marked by the following: a well-ordered and prayerful worship that focuses on the mystery of God; comfort with images, symbols, and ritual and the **intuitive capacity** in humans; the welcome use of reason and tradition in discerning the meaning of Scripture; an emphasis on welcoming questions, doubts, and various theological viewpoints; a commitment to informed and **growing faith** supported by formation and education; an insistence on God's revelation through a variety of means: Scripture, human experience, the church's tradition, nature, and various disciplines; special attention to the Incarnation and a love for the natural world; attention to the suffering of the earth and its many creatures; and an openness to the mystical dimension of Christian faith and life.

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What we discovered in our conversation is that each person is drawn to different aspects of this rich spirituality though we find that all of these marks make sense to us. As you look over them, is there one or two that you find attractive, meaningful? If so, why are they meaningful for you? We'll continue to consider the unique marks of Anglican spirituality: many of which have been voiced by people who live in the Pacific Northwest but do not regularly participate in a spiritual community: an openness to doubt and questions; a love for the natural world; a commitment to people and other creatures who suffer; the desire for a sense of peace; and a life marked by purpose and meaning.

Worship 101

Do I have to sing or recite very single word in the liturgy?

The quick answer is No. At times we will hear or read a phrase or sentence or hymn verse and think, "I don't agree with this." Worry not. You're not alone! You might hear something in the sermon and think, "What? I don't agree." Let's be clear on this: We do not aim for uniformity of thought in our worship. As a liturgy professor once told our class, "You can simply remain silent and say to yourself, I'm just going to walk on by that text." That's sound advice. No need to cross your fingers as you voice a text you just

might find troublesome. But, then, it's always helpful to know what you might find troublesome. Speak with the priest, the musician, or the wardens. Let us know what bothers you.


