A Message from Fr. Samuel Torvend

Avoiding Novelties and Fads

The American Benedictine nun, Joan Chittister writes this: "Like anything else, the spiritual life can become an elixir of novelties, a series of fads, an excursion into the whimsical. St. Benedict counsels Christians to submit themselves to the scrutiny of wisdom so that the spiritual [practices] they fancy have the merit of the tried and true, the sensible and the measured."

In a presentation on Lent, John Klassen, abbot of Saint John's Abbey, noted that he "resists the urge to have a long grocery list of Lenten resolutions. "Real change," he said, "takes concentrated effort. This is why it is good to pursue one practice that will lead to a sustained change leaving something behind that is unhelpful or destructive and replacing it with something live-giving."

In his book, The Power of Habit: Why We Do What We Do, Charles Duhigg encourages the pursuit of "keystone habits or practices." When we hit on one of these keystone practices, positive change spills over into other areas of life. Thus, telling a mentor or spiritual friend what that keystone habit or practice will be invites us to own it as our own and pushes us toward an accountability that might

not be present otherwise. As Chittister suggests, novelties, fads, and the whimsical rarely if ever lead to any substantive change in one's spiritual life.

So the practice of merely "giving up something" for a few weeks can become something faddish and whimsical, nothing more than a temporary deprivation: at the end of Lent we simply return to eating chocolate, enjoying a martini, or watching movies. One has to wonder how any of these can be considered a keystone habit, a practice that replaces something unhelpful, even destructive, with a lifegiving spiritual practice that will endure into the future, long after Lent ends.

Thus Abbot Klassen, echoing Benedict, invites us to focus on and improve one practice, just one practice: praying the Daily Office, or lection divina, or Centering Prayer, or meditating on Sunday's lectionary readings, or keeping silence in order to listen well to others, or increasing one's commitment to a charitable group by investing one's energy in it, or being reconciled to someone who had harmed us or we have harmed - each one a keystone habit that can spill over into other areas of our lives. The point is not to give up a favorite activity for a few weeks and then congratulate ourselves at the end of Lent. Rather, it is to engage a spiritual practice that will become more life-giving as we continue to practice it throughout the coming year.



Do you want to be part of our effort to feed these veterans? There are many ways to help. Each month, we can use:

- 1 person to plan the meal and line up volunteers;
- 2-3 people to help cook. Sometimes the cooking is done at home, and sometimes we cook in the church kitchen after services;
- 2-4 people to deliver the meal to the Village and lay it out. In warmer weather, we'll stay around, serve the food and chat with the residents. In the colder weather (like now), when few people are hanging out in the mess tent, we just set up the food buffet style, chat for a bit, and leave.

In all cases, there are the awesome volunteers on our core team that you will work alongside.

If you'd like to be involved, but none of these opportunities sound like a fit for you, then each month we will be asking for donations of desserts. Each dessert should feed 6-8. There will be a sign-up sheet in the narthex, so you can join us once to try it out or become part of our core team. Up to you!

Our next meal is on March 27; with cooking in our kitchen after the 10:30 service on **March 26.** We'll be making King Ranch Chicken Casserole. This is a gooey, cheesy dish with a Tex-Mex flair. Yummy!! *~Deacon Donna Arellano*

ome of you may have been wondering if we forgot to order paper plates and plastic forks for use during Coffee Hours and special events....or if we re-organized so well in the Wells Hall kitchen we can't find them any longer....but, the news is, we are not purchasing these disposable items any more.

Christ Church is moving toward becoming a **Green Parish.**

What does this mean? Moving forward, we are making small changes that will hopefully have a large impact. For example, instead of plasticware, we will be using the silverware we already have, and instead of paper plates that end up as mounds of trash, we can wash the dishes that we already own, in our own dishwasher.

Other small changes: purchasing LED light-bulbs to replace regular bulbs, purchasing recycled paper towels and napkins, saying no to Styrofoam and plastic, making sure to throw paper waste in the recycling bins instead of regular trash. usic has been resounding through the walls of Wells Hall throughout February and continuing this month, as we welcome the Tacoma Opera chorus and soloists during rehearsals for their upcoming opera, *Tacoma Method*. Please join in support of this important new work, which premieres March 31—April 2 at the Rialto Theatre. Ticket information follows at the end of this article.

Tacoma Opera's *Tacoma Method*, a bold new work by composer Gregory Youtz and librettist Zhang Er, reflects on the city's past to heal the future with a world premiere at the Rialto Theater in Tacoma March 31 – April 2, 2023.

"Recognizing the incident that tore down an emerging city is the reconciliation needed for generations to heal," said Tacoma Opera General Manager Limuel Forgey. "The discord is part of Tacoma's history – acknowledging that history through the arts and reflecting on, rather than repeating, is what inspires a future of caring and community."

Directed by opera tenor Barry Johnson, the Tacoma Method features an all-star cast who, along with chamber orchestra and chorus, bring to life the tragic true story about the expulsion of Tacoma's Chinese community during the late 19th century. More than 100 years after the incident, Tacoma Method comes to Tacoma's Rialto Theater March 31 through April 2, 2023 less than a mile away from where then-mayor Jacob Weisbach held his first rally. Composed by Pacific Lutheran University Professor of Music Greg Youtz and librettist Zhang Er, a Beijing born-and-raised Chinese poet teaching at Evergreen College, Tacoma Method features Soon Cho as Mrs. May, Allan Palacios Chan as Sing Lee, Ivy Zhou as Mrs. Lee, Robert McPherson as Mayor Weisback and Zachary Lenox as Ezra Meeker as some of the event's key figures.

OPERA

In February 1885, at an Alpha Opera House meeting in what is now downtown Tacoma, Mayor Weisbach roused a hostile crowd of white citizens to discuss how to expel the community's Chinese residents. By November, rioting ensued as a mob of more than 500 marched through the nearby Chinatown, stopping at every Chinese business and residence and forcing the occupants to leave their belongings, except for what they could carry. Most left, a few resisted, and what remained of the once prominent Chinese community was ransacked and eventually burned to the ground. The incident left fear and sorrow for the city of Tacoma and the Chinese people who still carry the emotional burden of what happened to their ancestors.



I had to vote for Chief Seattle, living in the PNW, and he made it through! His bio shares the story of very complicated relationships between tribal chiefs and European settlers.




