A Message from Fr. Samuel Torvend

What kind of rector do you seek?

The parish Search Committee is now in the process of reviewing applications from priests applying for the position of parish rector. It goes without saying that the search for a spiritual leader can be both exciting and nerve-wracking. While we trust the Search Committee to select a leader who matches well the rector profile presented in the Parish Profile, a new rector will inevitably mark a change: in personality and leadership skills, in preaching and working with vestry, committees, and teams, in pastoral care and administration.

A new rector will signal a transition and transitions can hold out the promise for new and needed initiatives as well as a measure of anxiety should new initiatives alter what might feel quite comfortable. The arrival of a new rector can also lead to a measure of projection on the part of some parish

members and friends: "We want you to be the messiah." Or, "We want you to lead us into the promised land of financial stability and membership growth."

Oh the poor head that has to bear such a crown! Think of it: the fate of the parish placed on one person's head. Please, God, no.

Leadership does matter as we know well in the political dimension of life. Lack of accountability or breach of trust can lead to serious allegations: consider the indictments of a former president just handed down by a grand jury. But here's the point: the function of leadership in an Episcopal parish is to serve the people, to support and challenge the people in Christian faith and life. It is less about the leader and more about what the leader offers the people of God gathered into this parish by the Spirit.

The radical vision of *The Book* of *Common Prayer* 1979 claims that all the baptized share in the work, the ministries, of the Body of Christ. It does not claim that spiritual leaders have the corner or monopoly on this work. This runs against a common perception in

American religious life: that as an organization of volunteers, it's up to the leadership to do the work while the people of God simply receive it passively. No and no again. No parish will survive let alone flourish with such an attitude.

Christ Church is blessed with members and friends who actively participate in the work of the parish, the ministries of the Body of Christ. This is an incredible blessing. While priests and deacons come and go, the people invested in the parish remain to carry on the holy work to which they have been consecrated in Holy Baptism and in which they are nourished in the Holy Eucharist. It is this holy work that asks for our attention: now, in six months, and into the future.

The funeral Eucharist with reception to follow will be on **Saturday**, **August 12**. The Eucharist will begin at 10:30 in the morning.


Sunday, August 13 12 Noon in the Parish Library Growing a Greening Parish



The Lord's Prayer and The Creation

When we pray the Lord's Prayer, we pray for creation care. "Your will be done on earth" echoes the ancient prayer in the Psalms: "Arise, O God, and secure justice on the earth" (Psalm 82:8).

Powerful people have brought imbalance to God's natural order on earth: flooding, excessive heat, drought, pollution, extinctions. As a consequence, the powerless – whether in the US or in the third world – suffer the most for this disordering of God's intentions for nature.

God's will, God's justice, God's rule addresses the needs of the powerless poor as God's central concern in this ancient Psalm (Psalm 82, verses 3-4), just as it does in Psalm 72, the prayer of blessing on godly rule, when the godly ruler delivers, shows compassion, rescues, and redeems the powerless and the poor (verses 4, 12-14).

So, when we pray the Lord's Prayer, we pray for God's justice to return and restore the balance of God's creation order for the sake of all of humanity: "Your will be done on earth."


The Little Pantry


t's so peaceful here! Just lovely," says Miss Erin, the Tacoma City Ballet Mistress of All, as she prepares for another day of pirouettes and jetés in Wells Hall. More than 50 ballet students of various ages began classes this past Monday morning at the start of their three-week Summer Session here at Christ Church, and Miss Erin oversees everything from the teaching of their classes to programming and advertising, and, managing their practice spaces.

The Ballet had been looking for a temporary home while their regular space is being renovated, and thanks to recommendations from our friends at the Tacoma Opera, found our beautiful wood floors and ample space perfect for dancing, at least temporarily.

During this past spring, the Merlino Building, their home for over 40 years also known for its housing of Corina Bakery and the Grand Cinema, or, if you've been around for a while, the Odd Fellows Building—had pieces of its 100+-year-old ceiling fall onto the floor, barely missing students' heads during ballet practice. After hearing about Wells Hall, it just took one visit for Miss Erin to know that our venue would be on the Ballet's list of best rehearsal and performance places in Tacoma.

Ballet students will be here through August 18, and then take a

> break for a few weeks before the start of their fall season, but they'll be back at the Merlino at that time. Miss Erin promises to return often, though, as she and the students absolutely love Wells Hall. They've been lunching each day in the courtyard, and the enjoying huge amount of natural light through the hall's many windows. "I have plans beautiful for this space," Miss Erin told this morning. me "Perhaps a couple of Black Box Theatre



Wells Hall has only a brief respite following the Ballet: next up is the Tacoma Opera, with rehearsals for their upcoming production of "Carmen." Opera singing will once again fill the hall each and every day from August 29th through the end of September, and although it is tempting, we'll need to avoid popping by for a while longer-you'll have to wait for your chance to hear the Habanera until they're at the Pantages. We'll have information on tickets for "Carmen" as we get closer to performance dates.

Request regarding upcoming Wells Hall Rentals

The Tacoma City Ballet (TCB) will be renting Wells Hall plus several rooms on the second floor (north side) from July 31 - August 18. During that time period, it is critical that we not enter their space when it is in use. If you need access to Wells Hall (ie. Kitchen), it will need to be coordinated with **Deborah**. We also ask that you not peer into the windows to watch the dancers practicing as this is very distracting to them. It is actually TCB policy that no one is allowed to view the dancers, including parents.

Livestream Update

We have been live on YouTube now since April 5, 2022. Following are a few interesting stats, with a little context.



Our YouTube "channel" currently has 80 subscribers. Just more than half are female over 65, the other half are split evenly in thirds between males over 65 and males

and females between ages 35-44.

We had 5,677 views through August 1, 2023, with over 84 separate stream events. We just hit the 1,000-hour total viewing milestone. YouTube suggested us 77,600 times, and 5.5% of the time someone clicked on the suggested video. Only 12% of the views came from searching, while around 50% came from suggested videos and people's feeds from their home screens.

Now for some context. YouTube has an auto play feature. Since this feature's inception, any time one of our streams comes up in someone's queue and starts playing, we get a view. At the high mark, YouTube heavily promoted Sunday 9/24/2022 8,600 times. (They do not say why they promoted that one in particular.) It has 499 views, but most people were no longer watching after 2 minutes in. Also the average viewing time for that video is about 2 minutes. Overall our average is 10.5 minutes.

Most of our videos have 5-6 screens tuned in the whole time while we stream, while having up to 5-10 more checking in. Funerals, musical events, and feast days have more screens viewing. We have a total of 30 to 50 views in the first week from our Sunday services, with feast days sometimes over 100 views.
