A Message from Fr. Samuel Torvend

Generosity has no season

In late October, I attended the Emergency Food Network annual gala where hundreds of people raised funds to support the central distribution center for the county's food pantries and meal programs. More than 10% of our neighbors suffer with food insecurity: not knowing if there will be a next meal. For those of us who have sufficient food, the incredible anxiety of not knowing how to feed one's

children may not be a part of our experience. Yet every tenth person in the county lives with such distress.

At Christ Church, our commitment to care for those who are hungry flows directly from the Holy Eucharist: we are fed freely from the generosity of Christ who labored for a just distribution of food

among the many poor. While the seasonal call to ensure that all people have ample meals at Thanksgiving and Christmas has begun, we know that generosity has no season: people need food year round. Our Little Food Pantry, the monthly meal for veterans, and individual contributions to EFN make a difference each and every day. Let us not lose zeal in doing good.

The Feast of Christ the King, the Reign of Christ

On Sunday, November 26, we join millions of Christians throughout the world in marking the end of this year of grace as we celebrate the Reign of Christ. On the following Sunday, we begin the beloved season of Advent. The gospel reading for the Reign of Christ is Matthew 25:31-46. Take a look at this reading before coming to church: it has served as the charter of Christian social action for close to 2,000 years.

November 26 also serves as the Ingathering of Pledges that will sustain our budget in the coming year. If you have not returned your pledge card to the parish office or placed it in an offering plate, bring it with you to church.

You bring forth wine to the gladden the heart

Living in a wine culture, the psalmist knew that wine is a gift from God, a gift to be used wisely and joyfully. It is also our spiritual drink through which we encounter the Presence of the crucified and risen Christ and receive the spiritual energy he offers us. On **Sunday, November 26**, bring a bottle or two of **ruby port** to church: our annual gathering of the fortified wine we use in the holy communion.

The memorial service for James Harris will be celebrated on Saturday, November 18, at 11 AM in the church. A reception will follow in Wells Hall.

Advent Quiet Morning: An Early English Advent

During the weeks of Advent, our Anglo-Saxon spiritual ancestors sang, prayed, and spoke of Christ as the hero and the precious stone (an inspiration for JRR Tolkien's The Hobbit). They spoke of the Blessed Virgin Mary as "the noble woman." In this Quiet Morning, we consider how their medieval English Advent sheds light on our American keeping of this beloved season. Three short presentations with each followed by silence and stillness for meditation, prayer, writing in one's journal, or taking a meditative walk with Anglo-Saxon Christian artwork. ONE PARISH ONE PRISONER

In our latest learning module, your OPOP team learned about the cost of re-entry for people leaving incarceration. If you've ever moved to a new town where you needed to find a place to live, furnishings, transportation, and a job without having a cash cushion to draw on, you have an inkling of the challenges our partner, Sonsaray, faces.

The goal of our team is to gather resources to 'roll away the stone' and allow Resurrection to happen for this young woman. Resurrection is a home, a job, transportation, and community. The stone, for most released inmates, weighs an average of \$3,000.

We have some excellent ideas for fun fundraisers that will not only raise money but also raise the Christ Church profile in our community – a priority for our Senior Warden and incoming rector, so win/win! If you thought about participating in the One Parish One Prisoner team but couldn't make a two-year commitment, here's your chance: partner with Peach McDouall in planning and executing one or more fundraisers, and help us roll away that stone for Sunni. 




Update on Sound System and live stream listening tips

The assisted listening system seems to be working OK on the FM receivers. Ask an usher if you need one. It will be awhile before the app-based portion is live.

Now for the tips for listening at home. The stream is set up to limit dynamics between the spoken word and the choir and organ and congregational parts. However, if there is a quieter organ piece or the choir is singing softly, it will be quieter on the stream. The presenters mics will come through louder and more distinct than the past (except maybe for the Gospel reading when a mic can't be used).

- 1. If you listen using only your phone or tablet or laptop speakers:
 - a. This will be the most difficult way to hear the full audio spectrum of the organ and choir. There is also a chance that you will not be able to turn the sound on the device loud enough to hear everything. Using a Bluetooth powered speaker or headphones would improve your experience.
- 2. If you are on headphones / earbuds etc ...
 - a. You should be able to hear most everything without changing the volume too much. We do have quiet periods followed by full volume in a few places in the service, so that may be startling.
- 3. If you have a laptop or other computer with wired or wireless Bluetooth external powered speakers:

- a. This would be a good option especially if you have had issues hearing in the past with just your internal laptop or tablet speakers.
- 4. Smart TV with YouTube app
 - a. This all depends on the quality of the internal TV speakers. Many TV models may not be loud enough, or have the clarity to hear the spoken word. Again, using external speakers will improve your experience.

We do read all input concerning the stream. We have taken steps when possible to improve your experience. I hope these tips will help too.


