A Message from Fr. Samuel Torvend

The Sound and the (Less Than) Fury

On Sunday morning, we tested the temporary sound system in church at 10:10. A number of choristers sitting in the back said, "We can hear you just fine," while another chorister, a few feet away, said, "It's muddy." After the Eucharist ended, one worshipper said, "I could hear everything clear as a bell!" while another worshipper, sitting less than five feet away from the first, said, "I could barely hear anything."

What are we to make of this difference given that we have only one sound system, not two? Is it possible that there are different capacities for hearing among us? Some worshippers have been greatly helped by using the assistive hearing devices available before the liturgy



begins. And our sound expert has installed a new temporary sound system with speakers that are directed at the people: not above heads or at feet.

We live in hope as we await the proposal for a permanent and effective sound system in a space that is

quite friendly to music but not to speech.



Advent Quiet Morning: An Early English Advent


Saturday, December 2, 10 AM to 12 Noon Change of venue to Trinity Chapel

During the weeks of Advent, our Anglo-Saxon spiritual ancestors sang, prayed, and spoke of Christ as the hero and the precious stone (an inspiration for JRR Tolkien's *The Hobbit*). They spoke of the Blessed Virgin Mary as "the noble woman." In this Quiet Morning, we consider how their medieval English Advent sheds light on our American keeping of this beloved season. Three short presentations with each followed by silence and stillness for meditation, prayer, writing in

one's journal, or taking a meditative walk with Anglo-Saxon Christian artwork. Listen for the Anglo-Saxon playing of the O Antiphons as you enter the church. Free and open to all. 

The Esoterics: Shadows & Sun A calendar of light Sunday, December 10, 2023 7:30pm

In December, The Esoterics will mark its 30th anniversary with a weekend of concerts featuring the world premiere commission -- A calendar of light -- by Los Angeles composer Dale Trumbore. Dale has enjoyed a fantastic career since winning The Esoterics' POLYPHONOS composition competition in 2014, and the group is excited to share her most recent work with you. To create this

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"calendar," Trumbore collaborated with the Pennsylvanian poet, Barbara Crooker. Trumbore's cantata of 24 movements that takes the shape of a cyclical calendar year, and is modular – featuring multiple starting points that allow the piece to begin or end in the same month as the piece is performed.

In A calendar of light, our relationship to change is mirrored in our relationship to the changing seasons. These range from small and personal changes -- our own daily triumphs and artistic failures - to the wide-ranging, devastating consequences of climate change. Crooker's stanzas ask resonant questions: "Is it impossible to plant change?" "How can we let it all slip through our fingers?" In the end, Trumbore and Crooker's calendar holds us accountable for embracing change and for altering our relationship with the earth for the better. Their piece calls for reflection and action, with recurring refrains and call -and-response movements that invite the audience to sing with the ensemble.


